Mrs. Emma Heflin Dies After Lingerin Illness

Mrs. Emma Louisa Heflin, 81 years of age, died at 11:30 o'clock Monday night at her home, 503 West First street after an illness of four years.

She was born February 10, 1865, at Bedford, Ia., the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Cook. She had been a resident of Maryville twenty-six years.

She was married to Robert E. Heflin January 29, 1885, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Smith Cas- teel, by whom she was reared. Mr Heflin died in 1920. Mrs. Heflin was a member of the Methodist church.

She is survived by one daughter, Miss Mayme Heflin, of the home, two sons, Hal Heflin, South Gate, Calif, and Don Heflin, Maryville; four grandchildren, five great-grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. Anna Stauble, Maryville.

Burial services will be held in the Wilcox cemetery, the land for which was a gift of the late Rev. Sylvester Heflin, father of her late hus- band. The Rev. Heflin was a cir- cuit rider and preached at Possum Walk and Elmo. Other funeral ar- rangements have not been com- pleted.
